The City of Nome is proposing a law enforcement and emergency operation project that will assist the community of Nome and our region prepared for, and respond to local and regional emergencies (natural and manmade). The project is in cooperation with Nome's Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), City of Nome Fire, Ambulance and Police departments along with our regional tribal non-profit Kawerak, Inc.

This project will enhance the community of Nome's and our region's ability to better prepare for and respond to local and regional large scale emergencies and disasters by providing the necessary pieces of equipment to operate an Emergency Operations center. Nome currently has an Emergency Operations Center that does not meet the needs for a local coordinated response for Nome and our region. In the past, Nome has had to facilitate a "piece-meal" response with borrowed laptops and equipment to facilitate and document (in real time) our community's and regions response to a natural disaster. This further complicated our ability to make sure all of the response information (Emergency Operations Plans, Standard Operating Procedures, hourly situation reports, Public Service announcements, secure and non secure communication by email) were available in a single location to facilitate a coordinated response.

This project will allow the city of Nome to provide a secure Emergency Operations center with state of the art technology to facilitate, direct and manage large scale local and regional emergency response. The equipment proposed will assist our community and region track response efforts through the use of the incident command system, assisting in directing command and general staff in accurately documenting community and regional response efforts. Items proposed are necessary to effectively lead and accurately document this type of response.

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This project will also enhance our local police department's ability to better respond to law enforcement calls for service by providing the department personnel with much needed equipment to facilitate safe and timely response. Nome Police Department, operated through the City of Nome has very limited staffing capability to prepare proposals to meet the equipment needs of its law enforcement department. This department has been heavily reliant upon our community through the city budgeting process to attempt to meet the needs of fully equipped staff, which has been difficult. We would like to request the much needed equipment and supplies to insure our law enforcement staff are thoroughly prepared to all types of law enforcement requests for service.

This project is in cooperation with Kawerak, Inc. Kawerak, Inc. provides social and economic benefits in the form of specialized knowledge and services to the villages of this region. There are 16 communities of the Bering Straits region that we serve, they are: Brevig Mission, Diomede, Elim, Gambell, Golovin, Koyuk, Nome (Council, King Island, Solomon), St. Michael, Savoonga, Shaktoolik, Shishmaref, Stebbins, Teller, Unalakleet, Wales and White Mountain.

Although the funding sought does not provide target hardening, it provides our community and region the ability to respond better to local acts of terrorism. We feel that our community and region is as prepared as possible with limited staff resources and the technical knowledge that specialize in terrorism preparedness and response to acts of terrorism. Additionally, with the acquisition of the law enforcement training module it will better enable our police to be prepared to respond to all types in emergencies including having the capability to identify acts of terrorism.

5. Identify potential challenges to timely implementation of this project and how start-up will begin within the first 90 days of award.

We do not anticipate any problems for timely implementation because the City of Nome has a solid acquisition policy and a well-supported accounting system within the organization. Once funding is received, an internal budget will be created. Within the first 90 days of the grant year, we will ensure that identified equipment is ordered within the limitations of the grant budget. Quotes from at least three vendors will be obtained and assessed. We will prioritize the most important items to purchase within the budget constraints and then we will place the orders. Once received, equipment items will be inventoried per our accounting policy and stored with the appropriate organization.

The proposed project addresses multi-jurisdictional needs by preparing not only the jurisdiction of Nome but also the member villages of Kawerak, Inc. The funding will assist the City of Nome to be better equipped to respond to natural and manmade disasters locally and regionally by working through Kawerak.

This project will have an overall benefit during times of emergency when the emergency operations center needs to be activated. This will enhance our ability to work directly with the State Emergency Operations center utilizing state of the art equipment and having the ability to better track resources during local and region wide response.

Additionally, it will decrease the time necessary to launch response equipment from Nome, the regional hub to any of the member villages in the Bering Straits Region.

For Nome and the Bering Straits region, securing the funding for this project is imperative. This program ensures that locally, Nome is prepared as well as our region to plan for and respond to natural and manmade disasters and emergencies.

Currently, there are no jurisdictional funds available in Nome or in any of the 16 villages to utilize to acquire much needed supplies and equipment other than staff services provided by Kawerak's Emergency Preparedness Specialist and Nome's volunteer based Local Emergency Planning Committee. The Emergency Preparedness Specialist will assist Nome and the communities in the Bering Straits region to develop and implement preparedness measures including:

- a) Identifying and providing emergency preparedness training;
- b) Emergency Planning
- c) Identifying and securing equipment grants
- d) Ensuring equipment and device type are similar across the region for ease of training and use;

This grant will be monitored and maintained by the City of Nome finance department. Equipment purchases will follow the City of Nome's procurement process. Quarterly narrative reports will be completed by the appropriate department. Since this is an equipment grant, funds for acquisition will be expended within the first six months. For equipment items that need to be purchased on

behalf of the regional communities the City of Nome agrees to turn this amount over to Kawerak to facilitate purchase.

City of Nome is proposing a sheltering and emergency preparedness project that will assist the community of Nome and our region prepared for, and respond to local and regional emergencies (natural and manmade). The project is in cooperation with Nome's Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) and regional non-profit Kawerak, Inc.

Nome's LEPC is a volunteer based committee funded by LEPC grant funds from DHS&EM to the City of Nome.

Kawerak, Inc. provides social and economic benefits in the form of specialized knowledge and services to the villages of this region. There are 16 communities of the Bering Straits region that we serve, they are: Brevig Mission, Diomede, Elim, Gambell, Golovin, Koyuk, Nome (Council, King Island, Solomon), St. Michael, Savoonga, Shaktoolik, Shishmaref, Stebbins, Teller, Unalakleet, Wales and White Mountain.

We propose to prepare for and stage emergency response items mainly in Nome for quick coordinated emergency response for our region. Similar to what other state and federal response organizations do statewide, we propose to stock and have available all items necessary to facilitate Nome's and any small communities response to a natural disaster. Nome and the Bering Straits region (16 communities) are located on the western coast of Alaska. Annually, it is expected that not only Nome but most of our 16 villages to experience fall and winter sea storms. Due to climate change, these storms have increased in severity and have forced our communities to look at preparing to open and operate local shelters. Most of the villages in our region have had the American Red Cross register each of the local schools in the region as a sheltering point. With this realization, community know they are ill prepared insure their community is adequately housed at these locations. We propose to have available, at request items necessary to operate a shelter. Additionally, we propose to insure each of our villages has the capability to communicate with the State Emergency Operations center by insuring they have an alternate power source. Through a separate grant most of our villages have been provided redundant communications (satellite phones).

We also propose to make available emergency medical packs, water filtration systems, portable illumination to insure they can operate a local emergency operations center.

Additionally, we have included a request to provide four large emergency shelters in Nome which will aid responders in providing on location sheltering for responses not in Nome's vicinity. For the villages, we propose to provide 10 smaller pop up shelters to insure they are able to provide local on scene sheltering if the need arises.
